How the COVID-19 Pandemic Has Changed the **LANDSCAPE OF PUBLIC HEALTH**



It uncovered systemic vulnerabilities.

The <u>underfunding of public</u> <u>health infrastructure</u> and <u>lack</u> <u>of pandemic response</u> <u>readiness</u> in the U.S. have come to light as related deaths surpass 600,000.



It prompted interest in reinvestment.

A 2022 <u>federal budget</u> <u>proposal</u> increases public health funding by a 21% from fiscal year 2021 levels.

It exacerbated other public health issues.

Behavioral health problems have spiked and preventative health care has been neglected, with <u>4 in 10 adults</u> reporting delaying or avoiding medical care during the pandemic.

It illustrated health disparities.

As communities of color were hardest hit by COVID-19, <u>health inequities</u> are getting much-deserved attention.



It forced turnover in leadership.

A number of <u>public health</u> <u>officials quit or were fired</u> during the pandemic.



It increased student interest in the field.

Schools of public health have seen a <u>40% increase in</u> <u>applications</u> for fall 2021.

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
